



Bible Verse of the Month



Happy 2019 Tabernacle Baptist Church, what an eventful 2018 it has been! I never could have imagined the adjustments we would be facing, yet here we are; continuing full speed for our Lord through the end of 2018 and now looking ahead to what God will do in 2019. I am looking forward to writing these articles for the next few months.

As we are working through this transition, a few thoughts have been lingering in my mind:

First, I think it is very interesting how God held his bride; the church; US; together. I don't know about you, but there were some very real ponderings in my mind. Would we hold together? Would we dwindle down? Would things as we knew them continue, or essentially stop over a few months time?

Secondly, I think it is interesting how we bonded together over a common goal; and that goal was not simply to "keep the gears of this church machine running". No, the goal seemed much deeper as we chatted, discussed, pondered, laughed, and exchanged ideas over the next several months. *We were passionate to see God reach the lost through us*, and all of our teaming up together was for that common goal.

are elements of this passage coming true right before our eyes at Tabernacle Baptist.


The passage seems to pivot on us as a Church family being grounded and focused on Christ and his mission. If we are not grounded in Christ and have devolved into simply a "Christian social club", Jesus' promise of "hell itself can't stop me" no longer applies. He said it Himself in Luke 19 that he "*...is come to seek and to save that which was lost*", and in Mark 2 "*...I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance.*" The Bible says many things, but if you had to boil it all down, you would have to say the Bible is a story of redemption. From cover to cover, God is making a way for us to come to Him.

I can't speak for anyone else, but if we as Tabernacle Baptist Church family put all of our energy into keeping Christ as our foundation, and eliminating things that don't point us in that direction, He promised that hell itself can't stop TBC from being effective.

I don't know about you, but I really like promises like that :)

With the holidays ending and all the baking finished it's time to step out of the kitchen, toss your kitchen towel to get washed and silently escape to your favorite burger place and let them wait on you for a change.....a burger with the works, fries and a thick chocolate shake. I personally like Nations (locally owned) or Fuddruckers is pretty darn good too.....Ok we still have to feed ourselves and families, so this is a super easy recipe you can make in that new crock pot you received for Christmas.

I like to add a crisp salad and a loaf of sourdough (the round one), sliced thin and slathered with butter. Use your blue and white gingham table cloth and your family will think you moved to Rome...

Crock Pot Lasagna



1 pound ground beef

1 box lasagna noodles (uncooked)

1 jar pasta sauce (Prego or perhaps you have your own put in the freezer from the last time you made spaghetti. (hint: try to always freeze some sauce from your spaghetti; it can always be used and no leftovers to be thrown away.)

1/2 cups cottage cheese (mom used cottage cheese, always budget minded... I use ricotta. When on a budget stick with the cottage cheese; it will save a couple bucks.)

1 1/2 cups cheese (mozzarella, grated... (hint: grating your own saves money)

2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese (hint: I personally like fresh grated. It can be found in the deli area in the refrigerator. It's in a little clear tub with a snap on lid...the Parmesan in the green can works too)

Brown ground beef and drain. Spoon 1 cup spaghetti sauce in bottom of 4 quart crockpot, your new one after washing it, no one knows what has touched the insides. Mix remaining sauce well with the drained browned beef. Place 2 uncooked lasagna noodles on sauce in crock pot (hint: the raw noodles will break. My experience is to break them in thirds and neatly place them over the sauce) Spread 1/3 meat mixture on top of noodles. Spread 3/4 cup cottage (or ricotta) cheese over meat. Sprinkle 1/2 cup mozzarella cheese over cottage cheese (or ricotta) .

Place another layer of ingredients as above. Sprinkle Parmesan cheese over top. Cook on low for 4 hours. It can cook longer, 6-8 hours. If cooked much longer it gets a bit well done.

Jim & Kristina Foster...South Africa

South Africa, We're Coming Home!

But, we're leaving a piece of us behind. In just 7 days, we fly from San Diego to London, London to Johannesburg, and Johannesburg to Cape Town. After 26 hours on airplanes, 6 hours in airports and almost 48 hours with little or no sleep, we will be HOME! Praise the Lord!

Over Thanksgiving, we were privileged to spend it with Briana in Colorado Springs and Jim's two brothers, who live in Denver. Briana hit the ground running in Colorado on September 18th as she started coaching ice skating at 4 different rinks in the Denver and Colorado Springs areas.

We were privileged to visit all the rinks where she worked and even met an amazing young lady with cerebral palsy with whom she works with as one of her weekly therapeutic students.

Briana also found a lovely retired military couple in Monument, CO to stay with, who has taken her in as an adopted daughter until she can find a more permanent place to stay. Saying goodbye to Briana was HARD! But, we did it with a thankful heart as we know she is where God has placed her.

Furlough Update!!!

I like math. So, statistics are fun for me. I calculated our travels these past 5 1/2 months and we have traveled 21,000 miles by airplane, 450 miles by Amtrak train and over 8000 miles by car visiting 26 churches (21 of whom support us) in 8 states. God has graciously provided places to stay along the way, cars to drive and even plane fare. We owe a big thank you for all those who took us in, loaned us their vehicles and picked us up at the airport at ridiculously early or late hours (those early and late flights are always the

cheapest - or the least points as we used mostly Southwest points). We also owe a huge debt of gratitude to those who have given generously so that we can serve in South Africa.

God has graciously provided 3 new supporting churches along the way and the funds to return on December 10th. We were - also able to raise more than \$2500 for Good Hope Christian School and monthly commitments for student sponsorship for several of our students. Some new churches are also considering taking us on for support. So, please pray for this as we still lack about \$650 in monthly support and need funds for an updated vehicle.

Good Hope Christian School - Growing Pains!

How do we minister to more children when we are stretched to our limits of time, energy and resources to serve those who attend our school? Well, we ask for your prayer in this regard. We have decided to take more students in Grade R (South Africa's version of kindergarten) as we seek to grow to a point where our teachers do not have to take two grades in a single classroom. We also had a long waiting list and wanted to accommodate as many families as possible.

However, we are also stretched financially with the transition from mostly volunteer American missionary teachers to all South Africans with the exception of myself (and an American missionary who does our music classes). More than \$15,000 of additional funding will need to be raised for next year to be able to be able to provide students in this low income community with discipleship and excellent academics with the love of Christ. I have sought to raise these funds through student sponsorship, but am still far from our goal with 2019 fast approaching. But, God is faithful and we trust Him for provision.

Church Planting News!

Please pray with us over the next several months as we visit different church plants in Cape Town and look for where God would have us do ministry next. Quite honestly, I am already stretched beyond belief as a teacher of 2 grades, principal, sports coordinator and husband and father. So, we have always realized that we would play a

supporting role in those churches we help to start. Regardless, the local church is vital to our strategy and very much a part of our lives.

Stephen & Angela Benefield...Cambodia
An Elderly Parent Saved

Since the overwhelming majority of Christians in Cambodia are first-generation Christians, every one of our church members has many immediate family members who are unsaved. As you can imagine, parents are of special concern to most of our church members, as well as grandparents, uncle, aunts, and siblings. We regularly pray for the salvation of our members' families, but to be completely honest, at times it appears hopeless. Jesus described the chance of a rich person getting saved with the camel-through-the-eye-of-the-needle metaphor. Sometimes I wonder what metaphor He would have used for the elderly, particularly the elderly who are steeped in a false religion. But while we don't know what metaphor He would have used, it really doesn't matter because "with God all things are possible."

A little over a year ago, a woman named Seena got saved. In April of this year she asked the church for prayer as she headed to her home province to celebrate the Khmer New Year with her family. I remember sending her tracts, booklets, and some simple instructions and ideas regarding sharing her new-found faith with her family. Her family was fine with her decision

to become a Christian, but they weren't interested in it, other than a basic curiosity which bordered on amusement. Last month, Seena's mother came for a visit to Phnom Penh. She had been reading some of the materials Seena left her as well as talking to Seena on the phone and another of our good ladies (the one who originally brought Seena). After sharing the Gospel with her for a couple of days, on Saturday evening, the other lady (Ming Rhadee) called me and said, "I'm bringing Seena's mother tomorrow and she wants to know more about Jesus." The next day, after the morning service, she said, "Pastor, I'm taking her to get her some lunch. Meet me back here in 30 minutes." After teaching her for about an hour, I was going to stop and let her digest what I had taught her, and arrange another time to meet with her. But when I suggested we stop, she said, "No...keep going." About an hour later she trusted Christ as Savior! It was exciting to share with the church in the evening service that Ming La had gotten saved. The blessing of her salvation was two-fold. First, the obvious...she's saved! Second, it was a great encouragement and challenge to the rest of our people who had gotten "weary in well doing" to get back into praying and witnessing mode with their families. One of our men headed to his home province a few days ago and he sent me a text message to let me know that he took a copy of the evangelistic booklet that we use ("Do You Know God?") to give to his dad who has recently expressed some interest in knowing more about the Gospel. Please pray with us about the relatives, especially parents and siblings, of our dear people. Pray that God will soften their hearts to the Gospel, and pray that God will give our people courage to share the Gospel with their loved ones.

One last thing about Ming La. After she got saved, I gave her several Gospel-themed booklets to share with others in her home village as well as 3 months worth of our devotional called Daily Light, and she promised she would read it all. A couple of weeks ago I was informed that one of Ming La's sisters has been reading the booklets and talking to Ming La and she says she is coming into Phnom Penh in December and wants to hear more about Jesus! Also, last Sunday I asked Seena how her mom was doing. She said, "She is reading the Daily Lights you

gave her, and she'll be back to see you again just as soon as she finishes them!"

Great Men's Meeting

For several years we have been praying for God to bring more men into our church and to give the men in our ministry more of a heart for God. Thankfully, we've seen numerous indicators of God answering that prayer, particularly this year. We have seen both an increase in the number of men getting saved and attending church as well as unmistakable growth in some of our key men. Since most of the other churches with whom we associate here in Cambodia have a similar need (for more men), we decided to host a men's meeting based loosely on the model of the Master's Men meeting held annually in Fresno, CA. Our home church has taken a big group of men to that event for many years and our pastor (my dad) has long considered it one of the most important events of the year. We figured if a time of preaching, singing, and fellowship specifically for the men could be such a help in CA, surely it would also be helpful in Cambodia too.

In November, we held our first annual men's meeting. We had prayed for 50 men, and for the majority of the event, we had 48 men there. Right as the final service started, 2 more arrived, giving us exactly 50 for the day! To be honest, when I was setting up the day before, I had determined we would not hit 50, so I only set up 42 chairs. Now, I know God didn't speak to me audibly, but He spoke to me nonetheless. Actually, He scolded me. In my heart, God said, "Wait...what? You've been praying for 50 for over a month and you aren't even going to set up 50 chairs?!!" So I set up 2 more rows, 54 chairs in all. I'm sorry to say, this is not the first time God has convicted me about praying without believing. I'm so glad He's merciful and gracious, even at times giving us more than we trusted Him for.

One Final Prayer Request

One of the good men in our church (named Ta) has been burdened for a co-worker to be saved. The co-worker's name is Hong, and he is suffering from kidney failure. The doctor's have recently sent him home telling them they could do nothing more for him. When Ta has tried to witness to him in the past, he has been completely uninterested. Now with his current desperate situation and his life slipping away, his heart has softened to the Gospel. I've been to his house 4

times in the past week trying to share the Gospel with him. Please pray that Hong will have enough relief from his pain and enough strength to listen to the Gospel and then that he would respond in repentance and faith. Also, he has a wife, mother-in-law, and 2 sons (1 a teen and 1 a young adult) who have also listened to me a little bit. Back to the first paragraph of this email, it's feeling right now a little bit like a camel through the eye of a needle, but at least they are listening. That's a good start, but this man doesn't have much time left.

As we approach the end of another year, we are once again reminded of all of the faithful supporters who have partnered with us to get the Gospel to the needy people of Cambodia. May God bless you this holiday season & the new year.

Reading the first part of Matthew 23 this morning reminded me of how very wisely the Lord Jesus answered the questions that the Pharisees and the Sadducees had asked him. He went on to explain to the disciples that they were to respect and obey the teachers of the law in what they were told from scripture to do, but they were not to do what the Pharisees did. Why? Because they did not practice what they preached!


I asked myself this question, one which I believe we could all pose to ourselves. Do I practice what I preach? Do I load people up with burdens that I am not willing to carry? Either physically or emotionally or even spiritually? Do I ask more of those around me than I am willing to do myself? Next question. Verse five comments that the Pharisees did what they did primarily for outward appearance. They loved to wear their "spiritual garb," to sit in places of honor, and to be called Rabbi. I have to ask, do I love my standing as a spiritual person, my seat of "honor" whatever that may be, the respect that is proffered to me, more than I love pleasing my Savior? Am I more concerned with what people think of me than what my Savior thinks of me? May it not be so.

I was talking with a friend the other day and we were discussing rewards given in Heaven by the Lord Jesus. How I covet hearing the Lord saying, "Well done," to me. I want to receive rewards done in my present life that are the result of pleasing Him. However, while we were talking, I had to ask myself, is this desire entirely pure? Do I want the Lord to reward me because I earnestly desire to please Him, plus nothing, minus nothing? What if I am more concerned, or concerned at all, about how I will appear before the judgment seat of Christ, in the eyes of my friends? Do I want to look good to them? What an ugly, puny motive that would be! I am asking

the Lord for the purest of motives, to simply please Him and express my love toward Him in all that I do.

So much of what we do or think is bound up in our childhood and needs to be eradicated as we become complete in Christ. One of the things I learned as a "preacher's kid" was that everybody was watching me all the time, so I better be good! That is not a good motive for doing right. That is a Pharisaical motive! The *Savior* is watching me, and that should be my *only* motive for doing right. If I obey Him and follow Him, all other things will fall in place! In fact, there may be times when the people around me, even Christians, will not agree with what I am doing or saying, but that doesn't matter. What matters is, am I pleasing my Heavenly Father?

My prayer for the New Year is a simple one. "Father, help my motives to be pure, and may what I think and do come out of a heart of love for You!"

January

God does not joke about His human creation going to hell!

Read: Luke 18:18–27

25: For it is easier for a camel to go through a needle's eye, than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God:

A pastor once said of verse twenty-five, "You see, even God has a sense of humor!

Can you imagine a whole body going through the eye of a needle?" Then he chuckled. Since when is God going to make a joke of someone not going to heaven? Christ was just emphasizing the seriousness of the matter. Christ went through much agony for us on the cross. He was aware of the suffering, He was going to endure (Matthew 26:39)! I do not believe Christ was making a joke of a rich man not going to heaven. Not then, or for us today. Do you really think Christ would make a joke of His human creation not making it into heaven (Mark 9:47)? Especially after the suffering He endured, to grant us access into heaven? Would we make a joke about our own children not getting into heaven? God has much more love for all of His human creation than we do of our own children (John 3:16). Paul preached about salvation through Christ alone (Philippians 1:21, 27). Christ talked about salvation through Himself (John 10:28). What do you talk about in your sermons? If you have not been telling people about how they can get to heaven, then you need to start! This is what the heartbeat of preaching is all about.

Goal:

As a follower of Christ we need to understand the importance of giving the gospel to the unsaved. Be like Paul and Christ, give the plan of salvation, because we never know who is ready to listen!

Library Corner

January 2019

I have always loved the old hymns. The church denomination I grew up in sang only A Capella. Later, when I heard those old hymns accompanied with a piano, it was the most beautiful combination of sounds that *I have ever* known.

For years, I have followed the traditional vs praise music controversy. Like the majority of church goers, I thought music is a choice. Having grown up in the rock music era, I understand people have different tastes, and preferences. Not everyone likes hymns. Some prefer modern and contemporary songs/ music in church. What's the harm in having a drum set on the platform, along with some electric bass guitar(s) and keyboards?

So when I *stumbled* across a book in our TBC Library, **Crisis in Christian Music by Dr. Jack Wheaton** I was intrigued. His sons are musicians and his father (who played violin, guitar, and trumpet) was a professional musician & band leader. At 9 years old, Dr. Wheaton began to study the piano and trumpet. He held a doctorate in both music and history. He composed musical scores for Hollywood feature films, was the past president of the International Association for Jazz Education (IAJE), recorded 10 CD's, and wrote 15 books. Chairman of college music departments, he was the minister of music for several churches, including one where he conducted and arranged music for a seventy-piece orchestra, and a ninety-voice choir.

I list his credits, (and they go on) for one reason. He is not *just some guy* with an opinion. Music has surrounded him his entire life, both in the secular and Christian arena. *What he has to say is so interesting and important that it will take more than one article to review. This brief summary is in no particular order and the writing is paraphrased for lack of space, but the thoughts are those of the book's author.

"The purpose of the Gospel and gospel music is not to entertain, but to uplift the believer and to bring the non-believer under conviction"... "In the 'Seeker Sensitive' churches, one must be careful not to offend bringing traditional hymns, preaching the power of the Blood, or threat of hell to the unsaved."

"In most contemporary worship music, the lyrics of the songs trivialize the basic standards of faith and create a false sense of familiarity with Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit."

The rationale is, "the introduction of this style of worldly music into the church worship service is the only way to attract young people to attend church..." "It is seriously dividing the body of Christ. One of the main reasons of church splitting is over music and worship service."

"Music worship should lead the congregation in serious, holy worship of the one true God and His Son, Jesus Christ. There are many spiritually and musically worthy contemporary praise songs that have been written."
